

NATO Secretary General Anders Fogh Rasmussen was one of a series of high-level foreign visitors to Georgia over the past week—a group that included numerous foreign ministers, a prime minister, and several US senators. The Alliance leader had high praise for Georgia, saying its democratic reforms are bringing the country closer to NATO, and adding that "Georgia is a special partner for NATO and a model of commitment." But Fogh Rasmussen's comments did not go over well in Moscow, where on Monday Russian foreign ministry official Aleksandr Lukashevich reacted by telling journalists: "Such statements show NATO still has not learned the lessons of the tragic events of 2008 in the South Caucasus and continues to send Tbilisi 'encouraging' signals'." <a href="https://www.rferl.org">www.rferl.org</a>

## OSCE/ODIHR Election Observers Underscore Progress in Creating Inclusive, Transparent Election

The OSCE Office for Democratic Institutions and Human Rights Election Observation Mission in Georgia on Tuesday released its first interim report on the Oct.1 parliamentary elections. The report emphasized that significant amendments were made to the election law and campaign finance law based on recommendations from the OSCE/ ODIHR, the Venice Commission, and the Council of Europe's Group of States against corruption, though some remain to be addressed.

The Georgian Central Election Commission is committed to enhancing inclusiveness, transparency, and stakeholders' trust in the elections, the report underscored. It also said the media environment is diverse, if polarized, and must-carry/must-offer provisions have expanded public access to a range of political views. Meanwhile, Georgia's new campaign-finance regulations are controversial, as is the implementation of them, but Bidzina Ivanishvili's campaign is nonetheless well-funded—near or above the maximum limit for party spending within a given campaign cycle—and Georgian Dream has been able to campaign actively across Georgia.

These views in the interim report largely reflect the findings of the OSCE/ODIHR report on the 2010 municipal Georgian elections, which were deemed largely free and fair, noting: The election administration managed the elections in a professional, transparent, and inclusive manner; contestants were able to campaign and to assemble freely; the large field of candidates provided voters with a genuine choice; the media broadcast a variety of election-related programs, including debates, allowing voters to make a more informed choice.

## Ahead of Election, US Delegation Urges "All Political Parties to Participate Fully," Abide by the Law

US Deputy Assistant Secretary of State Thomas Melia yesterday "urged all political parties to participate fully in the election process while abiding by the law" after leading an interagency delegation to Georgia this week. In offering his assessment of the electoral environment, he also "urged all parties to participate constructively and pursue political goals at the ballot box." He underscored that peaceful protests and the freedom of assembly are "hallmarks of democratic society," and that the delegation had assessed that the major parties could hold rallies, travel the country freely, and get their message out to voters. He also urged all parties to renounce violence. Melia welcomed election reforms passed late last year, which expanded access for parties to mass media during the campaign period. He noted that the passage of the "must carry" provision was also positive. Finally, Melia encouraged all parties to remember they must work together in parliament after the election. # Governing Party Increases Lead Over Georgian Dream, Says New Independent Poll

The governing UNM has increased its lead over Bidzina Ivanishvili's Georgian Dream coalition since June, says a new poll commissioned by the US National Democratic Institute (NDI). It found 37% of likely voters would vote for the UNM if the elections were held tomorrow, almost the same as in NDI's June poll. Georgian Dream suffered a 6% drop since June, with just 12% backing it now. As in June, the Christian-Democratic Movement (CDM) again had 3%. Meanwhile, Vano Merabishvili, who became prime minister in early July, has improved his standing, with 62% of respondents saying they "like" him, up from 55% in June, when he was interior minister. Ivanishvili's favorability suffered a 7% decline, with 39% of respondents saying they "like" him, according to the August poll. The survey was fielded by the Caucasus Resource Research Centers for NDI on Jul. 31-Aug. 12 and was funded by Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency. It was conducted through nationwide face-to-face interviews with 2,038 respondents, and has a margin of error plus/minus 3%.

Georgia Holds First National TV Debate; Ivanishvili Fails to Show On Sunday, the first televised debate between candidates in a national election in Georgian history took place. Organized by GPB in partnership with USAID and the International Foundation for Electoral Systems, it featured three candidates—PM Vano Merabishvili, Giorgi Targamadze, Christian Democratic Movement leader, and Shalva Natelashvili, who heads the Labor Party. Bidzina Ivanishvili, the Georgian Dream Coalition's candidate, refused to appear, indicating that the other candidates were not of the same stature; Georgian Dream was represented at the debate by an empty podium.

#### NATO Leader Praises Georgia's NATO Progress in Visit to Tbilisi

NATO Secretary General Anders Fogh Rasmussen praised Georgia for its strong commitment to NATO and to democratic reforms in a visit to Tbilisi last week. He said Georgia's reforms are bringing the country closer to NATO. "Georgia is a special partner for NATO and a model of commitment," he said after talks with President Saakashvili.

"We are deeply thankful for the courage, determination and professionalism that your troops show every day," Fogh Rasmussen said of Georgia's "very significant" contribution to the Alliance-led ISAF mission in Afghanistan. He also commended Georgia's commitment to finding a peaceful resolution involving its Russian-occupied regions of S. Ossetia and Abkhazia, and reiterated NATO's "unwavering support for Georgia's territorial integrity and sovereignty."

#### NATO to Hold Disaster Response Exercises in Georgia

NATO disaster response exercises dubbed will be held in Georgia from Sep. 22-28. Teams from 11 Euro-Atlantic Partnership Council nations are planning to participate; all together, more than 1,000 members of civilian and military teams from NATO and partner countries will take part in the event. The scenario for the exercise will be a severe earthquake affecting the vicinity of Tbilisi, resulting in high numbers of victims and widespread damage to critical infrastructure, including chemical spills and a radiological incident. The exercise will allow NATO and partner nations to practice procedures and capabilities, in order to improve their ability to respond to a disaster. The exercise will also contribute to strengthening the stricken nation's capability to effectively coordinate consequence management operations.

## Foreign Direct Investment Continues to Climb, Rising 6.7% in First Half of 2012

Foreign direct investment n Georgia grew 6.7% year-on-year in the first half of 2012 to \$488.8 million, Geostat said this week. Investment in manufacturing led the way, with \$106.5 million or 21.8% of the total, while \$96.2 million went to transportation projects, \$93.2 million went to energy, and \$81.1 million to the financial industry. German companies were the leading investors with \$135.3 million, followed by those from Turkey with \$43.1 million, and Azerbaijan with \$40.7 million.

square, chanting their leader's nickname: "Misha! Misha!" Said the
President's Dutch-born wife Sandra Roelofs in fluent Georgian:
"Behind your smiling faces there are still a lot of problems; we are
going forward with huge steps but more is needed, and there is no
doubt that we will do this." Most opinion polls have suggested that
Saakashvili's party has a significant lead over the opposition.

AFP: Georgia detains Russian militant after border clash

Georgia on Saturday said it has detained a Russian militant fighter, one of the remnants of an armed gang that recently clashed with security forces near the enemy states' border leaving 14 dead. "The Georgian interior ministry has detained one of the members of the armed group in the Lopota Gorge, Akhmet Chataev, a citizen of the Russian Federation from the North Caucasus," the ministry said. Officials have said the clash with the alleged Muslim militants broke out last month when Special Forces confronted an armed gang which had crossed over from Russia's North Caucasus region of Dagestan, where the Kremlin has been battling an Islamic insurgency. www.afp.org

Svaneti, the most famous and far-flung of Georgia's mountain provinces, has come to represent an idolized version of what is typically Georgian: a land of folk-heroes and strange mists, of crumbling towers and sacrificed goats, of atonal pandauri melodies and sequestered icons, one of the few places in Georgia to maintain a vestige of cultural purity against the onslaught of Ottoman, Mongol, Arab, Persian and Russian invasions that has come to define the splendid cosmopolis of Tbilisi.
